

# Our 75th Anniversary Extravaganza

I distinctly remember a phone call back in February of 2001 from a person I used to consider a friend. He asked me whether I would consider "helping out" with South's 75<sup>th</sup> Reunion, which was about two years away. He assured me that there would not be much involved and I quite naively agreed to lend a hand. By May of 2001, I was Chair of the Reunion. How that came about remains to this day a mystery to me. I recount this story as a warning to all of you: if you get a call about eight years from now asking if you can "help out" with the 85<sup>th</sup>, have your wits about you!

The saving grace in all of this was the incredible group of volunteers who formed the 75th Reunion Committee. Through two years of meetings, frequently characterized by moments of high tension, this group remained dedicated and cheerful. We managed always to reach acceptable compromises (with only minor bodily injuries) and people simply went off and did their assigned tasks.

From our perspective, the 75<sup>th</sup> was a success and we have been encouraged by the many notes and e-mails and newspaper letters stating what a good time everyone had. I must admit that the weekend was a bit of a blur for me – a state I cannot attribute to overindulgence – and what stands out now are the wonderful memories:

 That great group from the late 40's and early 50's who were already lining up two hours before opening time on Friday

- That incredible school show, including the great third act, that made all of us realize again how much talent has come through this school
- The guys from the football team still slinging beer cases into the truck at 2:00 a.m. and doing so with a smile!
- The tears when the World War Two Veteran finally got his high school diploma after sixty years
- The sharing I saw in the Writers' Room as authors read and listened and talked
- The crush of people in the Gym on Friday night that was so reminiscent of School Dances (except that the alcohol was legal this time!)
- The great volleyball on Saturday morning, illustrating yet another area in which South students have excelled
- The amazing sight of over 2,000 people at the Progress Building, that hangar of a building transformed to a magical site by a lot of hard work
- The Church service that brought together so many individuals in a feeling of love and commonality
- Finally, the return of so many teachers – at least one well into her nineties – all of us agreeing that South was a great place to teach.

Are there things we should have done differently? Yes, of course. In an undertaking of this size, there are bound to be. The group photos have presented problems that we are addressing. Trying to use the arena as well as the school on the Friday night was probably a mistake. Better to squeeze people into the Gym and Cafeteria than to spend the evening

attempting to coerce the crowd to move over to the arena, an undertaking at which I failed completely. We have made notes of hundreds of suggestions and will pass these on to the group planning the 85th to be held in 2013.

We are disappointed that the Scholarship Fund did not reach our goal of \$75,000, but we are keeping the drive going till the end of 2003. (There is still time for your graduating year to reach the \$1000 mark!) [see page 4]

In February 2003, the South Collegiate Alumni Association with help from Andrew McClenaghan ('97) of Echidna Solutions Corp. (www.echidna.ca) launched the South Alumni site. (www.southalumni.ca)

The site's main objective was to create a centralized space on the Internet that South Alumni from across the globe could navigate to in order to find out what was going on at their former high school. The site features the latest news and dates about all things South. The semi-annual *Lion's Pride* newsletter will also reside on the website, which will reduce distribution costs immensely.

Another key feature of the website is the South Alumni Online Registry.

Although the South Collegiate Alumni Association has extensive records on South Alumni, it is difficult for them to keep this information up to date as Alumni are always on the move. The online registry allows Alumni to create a user name and password and enter their address information, and more importantly their e-mail address, into the official records.
